


Making progress

Connecting Cambridgeshire recently provided a <u>Digital</u> <u>Connectivity Progress Update</u> summarising progress in the delivery of the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Digital Connectivity Strategy for 2022-2023.

The report, presented to the Cambridgeshire & Peterborough Combined Authority (CPCA) Transport and <u>Infrastructure Committee on 13 September</u>, details how the programme is driving next-generation broadband connectivity and mobile coverage, using Smart technologies to improve the environment, and extending free public access Wifi, while supporting digital inclusion.

It also highlights our collaborative work with multiple partners, which underpins wider ambitions for the region including greater use of sustainable transport, reducing health inequality, progress towards net zero and mitigating climate change.

Funding bids bring >£10m

The Connecting Cambridgeshire team has successfully bid for over £10 million additional funding from government and commercial partners to support innovative technology projects aiming to unlock new connectivity opportunities and encourage investment in the county's digital infrastructure.

Smart Poles - Innovative plans to make Cambridgeshire County Council-owned street lighting columns (Smart Poles) available to the telecoms market to host a range of devices have been awarded £220k government funding from the DSIT Smart Infrastructure Pilot Programme (SIPP) match funded by industry partners.

Smart Poles in selected locations will be developed to host devices including small cells to improve mobile coverage, environmental sensor networks, public access Wi-Fi and potentially electric vehicle charging. The successful bid was announced at the Connected Britain conference on 20 September.

Members Update





The CORE Project will develop and trial an open radio access network (RAN) solution to improve 5G mobile capacity for high demand, densely populated areas of Cambridgeshire.

Supported by Cambridgeshire County Council, the Cambridgeshire Open Ran Ecosystem (CORE) Project has been awarded over £6.5 million in the Dept. for Science, Innovation and Technology (DSIT) Open Networks Ecosystem (ONE) Competition. This will be combined with £2.7million commercial investment from a consortium of next-generation infrastructure service providers, technology developers, mobile network operators, renowned research universities and market-leading equipment manufacturers, led by Connecting Cambridgeshire.


5G Innovation Regions bid - Connecting Cambridgeshire is also supporting a joint regions funding bid to DSIT for up to £3.8m from the 5G Innovations Regions (5G IR) to drive adoption of 5G and other advanced wireless technologies to create a more inclusive, competitive and innovative digital economy.

Led by Oxfordshire County Council, the region comprises Buckinghamshire Council, all Berkshire Authorities (represented by West Berkshire), Central Bedfordshire, and Cambridgeshire & Peterborough Combined Authority. This region has multiple synergies, including education, R&D, advanced manufacturing and technology, similar mixes of rural environments and agriculture, and the importance of transport and logistics with East West Rail and HS2 under construction. The outcome of the bid is expected to be announced in November 2023.

Digital Inclusion – request for information from Members

Do you know about the Digital Switchover?

The UK's telephone network is changing. Sometimes referred to as the "Copper Switch Off", between now and 2025 most telephone providers will be moving their customers from old analogue landlines over to new upgraded landline services using digital technology.
